Attendance & Truancy FAQ's

Regular school attendance is essential for a student to make the most of his or her education to benefit from teacher-led and school activities, to build each day's learning on the previous day's, and to grow as an individual. Absences from class may result in serious disruption of a student's mastery of the instructional materials; therefore, the student and parent should make every effort to avoid unnecessary absences.

What is Truancy or "failure to attend school" charges?

An offense of Failure to Attend School is charged based upon:

- The requirement to attend school under Section 25.085; and
- If they fail to attend school on 10 or more days or parts of days within a six-month period in the same school year or on three or more days or parts of days within a fourweek period, unexcused

What does the law say?

Texas requires a child who is at least 6 years of age, or who is younger than 6 years of age and has previously been enrolled in first grade, and who has not yet reached his/her 18th birthday to attend school unless exempt by law. Students enrolled in prekindergarten or kindergarten shall attend school.

Under Texas Education Code 25.094, a student is in violation of the Compulsory Attendance law if the student is absent 3 days or parts of days in a four week period or 10 days or parts of days in a six month period. <u>Tardiness is considered part of a school day</u>. It is the responsibility of the parent to monitor their child's attendance. As a reminder, according to Texas Education Code 25.093, a parent is subject to prosecution when his/her child fails to attend school regularly.

How many unexcused absences will trigger truancy charges?

Once the student accumulates 10 <u>UNEXCUSED</u> absences within a 6 month period, Truancy Charges SHALL be filed. Filing with the court system for missing 10 days or parts of days (unexcused) in a 6 month period is <u>Mandatory</u> by state law.

If I have a doctor or parent note, does that count towards my 10 days?

Medical and excused absences do not count towards the 10 days for filing. Emails or written notes from doctors or parents must be received within <u>3 days</u> of the absence in order for it to be excused. Phone calls <u>do not</u> excuse absences- a written note or email must be sent in. Notes after 3 days will not be accepted.

<u>Can I excuse a tardy?</u>

Tardies are not excused, even with a note. Tardies are marked as missing part of a day and count towards the 10 unexcused absence trigger. The elementary school day starts at 7:50 am - students must be <u>in their classroom at this time</u>, not just in the building.

Why do I get those attendance letters?

Letters will be sent to parents once a student has reached <u>3 unexcused absences</u> and again at 7 <u>unexcused absences</u>. The letters serve as a reminder of state law and a warning that charges will be filed once a student gets 10 unexcused absences. Remember, tardies count as unexcused absences as the students are missing a part of the school day.

I filled out the vacation form, why are those absences unexcused?

Forms for vacations serve as a notification to schools that your child will be gone and allows your child to make up missed work. Vacations or family trips <u>will not</u> be counted as excused, even with parent notification. The days missed for a family trip will count towards the 10 days that trigger a truancy filing.

If your child will be gone for a period of more than 10 consecutive school days, they will be automatically un-enrolled on day 10 and truancy charges will be filed.
