SCHOLARSHIP OPPORTUNITIES

1. CARR P. COLLINS SCHOLAR PROGRAM

Baylor University annually awards scholarships through the Carr p. Collins Scholars Program to studentswho have demonstrated leadership through service. Collins Scholars are awarded a minimum of %5200 their freshman year, renewable for three additional years. To be considered for the program, applicants must meet all niverity requirements for uncondicional admission; have a minimum combined math and evidenced-based reading and writing score of 1310 on the Scholastic Assessment Test (SAT) or a minumim of 28 on the American College test (ACT); have completed a balanced college preparatory program including history, science, and a foreingn language; be in the top quarter of their graduating class; and be a resident of the State of Texas.

Baylor University also has an outstanding scholarship program for national Merit Finalist. Students who advance to Finalist standing in the National Merit Scholarship competition and designate Baylor University as their first choice college receive the Regent's Gold Scholarship. This scholarship covers full tuiton plus an additional amount ranging from \$2000 to \$4000, depending on the Finalist's SAT/ACT score.

We encourage the use of baylor's scholarship and Cost Estimator (<u>https://www.baylor.edu/estimator</u>) to determine their eligibility for an academic scholarship and receive an estimate of their overall financial ait at Baylor.

2. UNIVERSITY OF NOTRE DAME - SCHOLARSHIPS

Notre Dame is setting a benchmark in higher education by integrating its 24 merit scholarship programs into a single office with a faculty director.

Students who are considered for merit scholarships at Notre Dame demonstrate exceptional accomplishment, leadership, commitment to service, an intellectual promise.

We invite students to apply for admission at admissions.nd.edu.

A student's completed application for admission to the University is used for consideration for merit aid and no nomination is required.

Frisco ISD utilizes ChooseToCare, an online and phone-based "tip-line" for students, parents, teachers and others to anonymously share any safety or health concern they may have regarding our schools and school community. It is another option for those with valuable information, who may have concerns or fears about using other established methods for communicating their information to school authorities.

Tip-lines have helped many organizations, public and private, to detect problems early on, minimizing harm and in many cases preventing it all together. When properly implemented, tiplines serve to support a climate of safety, honesty and integrity within the organizations they serve.

ChooseToCare enables users to provide school officials with valuable information, securely, and from the privacy of their own homes. It is not meant to replace traditional and established methods of communication, but to supplement them. By providing another option for members of our school community (students, parents, administrators, teachers, etc.) to offer valuable information that they might otherwise choose to keep to themselves, ChooseToCare helps ensure that our schools will remain safe for all.

She will have a display to educate parents on what to be on the lookout for with drug paraphernalia commonly used by teens. This presentation is for adults only due to the sensitive information given, please no students in the presentation.

At 6:00, a representative from the National Center for Missing & Exploited Children Texas Regional Office ("NCMECTX") will provide a presentation for parents discussing the apps and websites kids are using, how to identify warning signs of kids engaged in risky behavior online, and how to discuss appropriate online behavior with kids. Topics include cyberbullying, sexting, sharing too much information online, online privacy, and abduction prevention.

8 Ways to Take Control of Your Time

Your brain needs rest to perform at its peak. If it's time to sleep, list the things you still need to get done on the next day's to-do list and go to bed.






<u>1 – THE SOCIETY OF WOMEN ENGINEERS AT TEXAS A&M</u>


