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
Who creates your award package?

The government does NOT create award packages.



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

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3) Make Your Decision

You don't have to decide overnight. Many colleges don't expect your final decision until May 1, so you have some time to make up your mind. But remember that colleges are serious about reply deadlines. If you don't send your deposit in time, you risk losing your place.



4) Respond to the Colleges

Once you've decided which college you want to attend, inform all the colleges that accepted you about your decision.

Respond to the college you've decided to attend. Make sure to send in the following items by the deadline:


- Your acceptance letter
- A deposit
- A separate acceptance letter for financial aid, if required
- Any other required items

Respond to the colleges whose offers you're declining. Send a brief note to the other colleges to thank them and turn down their offers. This frees up places for other students.

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5) Take next steps needed prior to first day of class:

- Select housing and dining options
- Complete high school requirements
 - o Important to maintain grades/attendance necessary for graduation
 - Student is responsible for making sure university receives final transcript from high school
- Orientation
- Registering for classes
- Consider Greek life/Prepare for Rush Week
