The Advanced Placement Program, "AP" for short, was created by the College Board in 1955, as a way for motivated high school students to get a head start on college. Based on a student's performance on the challenging, end of course AP exam, they can earn college credit, placement in advanced college courses, or both, while simultaneously fulfilling high school requirements.

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BASIC INFORMATION

GRADUATION PLANS

All students enter the 9th grade on the **college-bound graduation plan** which requires 26 credits. Students may choose to pursue different endorsements per TEA. Each semester passed in a course which counts toward graduation earns a .5 credit, thus a year-long course equals 1.0 credits.

GPA

The Grade Point Average (GPA) is determined by the weight awarded to specific courses when determining a student's rank in class. Advanced courses are given extra grade points to account for the added challenge. For example, an 85 in an on-level course earns 3.5 grade points, whereas the same grade in an AP course is worth 4.5 grade points.

COLLEGE CREDIT

Students can receive college credit for AP scores ranging from 3 to 5. Students must research individual colleges to see which scores will provide credit. Each college and university has their own AP articulation guidelines. For example, one college may award 3 hours of English college credit for a 4 but another college might require a 5 to receive the same credit.
