

Step 1: What Should I Major In?

- Personality Assessments
- Career Assessments
- Hands on Experience

Step 2: Take The ACT or SAT

 ACT- The ACT contains four sections: Reading, Math, English, and Science.

 SAT- The SAT contains three sections: Reading, Math, and Writing.

Both also have an optional essay. Each section has a different format on the ACT compared to the SAT.

Step 3: Extra Curricular Activities

- Students should participate in at least one activity during the school year.
- Activities may include sports, band, or clubs and organizations.

Step 4: Maintain Good GPA

A good GPA will set student apart from other candidates.



Step 5: Community Service

 Make sure that community service is repetitive and consecutive over at least two years.



Step 6: Look at Colleges that Specialize in Major

- Encourage your child to apply to at least 4-5 schools.
- Encourage your child to have at least 1 reach school.
- Attend college fairs.
- Tour prospective colleges.

Step 7: Visit Campuses

- Make Appointment
- Ask Questions
- Get to know Admissions Counselor
- Ask current students questions.

Step 9: How to Apply to Schools

Step 10: Transcripts

- Transcripts may be sent early to admit a student provisionally, but all schools require a final high school transcript.
- Be sure to check final high school transcript for accuracy.

Step 11: Immunization Records

If a student is under 22 when he or she enrolls into a college or university, the state of Texas requires that he or she have the meningitis shot proof submitted 10 days prior to the first day of class.

Step 12: Letters of Recommendation

- Please give a 3 week notice to person writing letter.
- Please make sure that person writing the letter has known student at least two years.

Step 13: Admissions Essay

- Authentic Voice
- Tone
- Passion



Step 14: Early Decision vs. Early Action

- Early decision plans are binding a student who is accepted as an ED applicant must attend the college.
- Early action plans are nonbinding students receive an early response to their application but do not have to commit to the college until the normal reply date of May 1.

Step 15: How to Apply for Financial Aid

- □ Go to https://fafsa.ed.gov/.
- As of last year, FAFSA was made available on October 1.
- □ Please encourage your student to apply early.
- The easiest and fastest way is to file the FAFSA online with your FSA ID, made up of your username and password. Your application will be processed within 3 5 days.

AP VS. DUAL CREDIT

AP courses are part of the College Board organization that requires students to take a rigorous test at the end of the course to potentially earn college **credit**.

A **dual credit** course on the other hand is an official college course and student must make 70 or higher in the class to pass.

Step 16: How to Find Scholarship Money

- FAFSA is not required for Merit or Needs Based Scholarships.
